

More about the Key Stage 3 day

Pupils are shown around the Hall in small groups led by experienced guides mostly experienced teachers. This takes a maximum of one and a half hours.

Fees for the KS 3 tour (up to 35 pupils) will be:-

£4.50 per pupil (minimum fees £80) Teachers / Accompanying adults free

This visit is designed for Key Stage 3 pupils studying the Tudor Period or English Reformation and conflict with Catholics including the work of Nicholas Owen.

Visit timing to be agreed with Hall, usually starting at 10am

Pupils will have the opportunity to

- tour the house with an experienced guide and see the famous Harvington Hall priest holes;
- learn about the work of Nicholas Owen;
- Learn about life in a Tudor household both above and below stairs;
- Activities for the day can be adapted to suit the prior learning of the pupils.

The Hall is also suitable as an inspiration for creative writing or art projects and can be used for science investigations.

Aims and Outcomes

Aims

Pupils will

- investigate the religious significance of Harvington Hall;
- appreciate that religion was an important issue in the 16th century;
- appreciate that religious tolerance was not common in the 16th century and that people were expected to belong to the state church or religion.

Outcomes

Pupils can

- understand the religious significance of Harvington Hall and its connection with Nicholas Owen;
- infer from sources and narratives why religious belief was so significant in the 16th century and why these times were so turbulent;
- infer from sources and narratives that religious beliefs and political structures were linked.
